ADMIN COORDINATOR: Brittney Hurley Between school visits and family trips, my kids have been to two pumpkin patches and an apple orchard and it's not even Halloween yet! Agritourism is a booming industry that brings people from cities and suburbs to farm country. Amidst the hayrides, tire swings, and bouncy castles there is an important reminder. We want our children to understand and appreciate where their food comes from, but the vast majority of them will not work in agriculture. In 2020, the USDA estimated that the agricultural and food sectors represented only 10.3% of total U.S. employment. Direct on-farm employment represents only about 1.4% of US jobs.

That's an important insight for the church as well. So many of our scriptural stories and metaphors relate to farming and herding and yet few of the folks in the pews (or in the pulpits) have direct experience raising crops and livestock. We might overlook some important teachings for want of experience. That includes the concept of a "first fruit offering."

In Leviticus and Deuteronomy, the scriptures teach the people of Israel how to be faithful stewards of what they will grow and raise in the Promised Land. Many of us are familiar with the concept of the tithe. We often overlook the other offerings in those texts. In addition to the tithe, the scriptures call upon the Jewish people to make a first fruit offering. When they begin their harvest, they take some of the very first of their crop to the temple and offer it to God. They will complete their full harvest, calculate their tithe, and bring that at the end of the season. This

happens at the beginning.

I think most of us read that passage and think it is a lovely gesture of gratitude. It might take a farmer to appreciate how radical it is. My Uncle Stanley is a farmer in Delaware County. We know that we can always visit our family in Delaware but, if we go at certain times of the year, we are very unlikely to see Uncle Stan. If the weather is right, he will spend much of the fall out in the field harvesting his crops. He's up early and he's out late. When my aunt first married him, she told my father, "I see him three times a day, hungry." It's hard to imagine Stan, or any other

hardworking farmer, pausing in this critical time of year to carry sheaves of wheat to the temple, but that is just what the scriptures tell us.

I believe these scriptures are teaching us an important lesson about gratitude and stewardship. We find it comforting to wait until all is said and done and then we settle up accounts. We like year-end giving and legacy giving because they fit nicely with that narrative. Those are both appropriate and scriptural ways to give, but they are not the only ways. The first fruit offering reminds us of another spiritual practice. We can give in the moment. We can give as a form of celebration. Like a prayer before a meal, we can give before partaking in God's bounty just as much as we can give after.

We have wonderful farmers in our community and in our parish who can apply this scripture in a direct way. How does it look for the rest of us? What is harvest like in your household? Some folks give out of their weekly or monthly paycheck. Some folks give when they receive their tax rebate. People give when they have an unexpected windfall or when things pick up at work. It's easy to become distracted at moments like these, but our scriptures teach us that it is precisely in these moments that we should turn our hearts to gratitude and ask how we can give back.

So, this harvest season, I invite you to prayerfully consider what harvest looks like to your family and to support our church and its mission with your time, talents, and donations.
